UNITY IN DIVERSITY –THE ATTRIBUTE OF MAJOR SEMIOSIC NON-VERBAL CONSTRUCTIONS

Abstract

The vast domain of the gardens – defined from a semiotic perspective as major semiosic non-verbal constructions, is usually made up of heterogenous elements connected to each other through various relationships, so that to create a meaningful whole. The heterogenous elements – be they natural or artificial, created by people– are selected, arranged, combined and ordered in a targeted manner to form a coherent whole, producing a unity in diversity – the attribute or the defining characteristic of any garden.
